You really are spoiled for choice when looking for historic accommodation in Trim. Here you will find Hotels, B&B's and self-catering accommodation. We recommend: Trim Castle Hotel, for its proximity and views of the Castle, The Castle Arch Hotel, as one of Trim's oldest buildings, and Highfield House as another historic building in Trim.

Lunch

There are some great spots in Trim for a tasty lunch — whether you're after a casual café, classic pub fare, or a sit-down mid-day meal.

Trim River Walk

Take the Trim Porchfields Walk, and discover Newtown monuments. The Newtown Monuments are a remarkable collection of medieval ruins set on the banks of the River Boyne — including a large cathedral, two monasteries and a small church dating back to the early 1200s. Once part of a thriving ecclesiastical settlement founded by Bishop Simon de Rochfort, the site offers a fascinating glimpse into Ireland's Norman-era history and is free to explore

Coffee at Marcies



This is a lovely little spot where you can grab a great coffee to warm you up or refuel, and in the warmer months their ice cream is a real treat. Marcie Regans also overlooks The Priory of St John the Baptist. The Priory is also free to visit and provides more information on Trim's past.

Breakfast

Trim Castle

Trim Castle is Ireland's largest and best-preserved Anglo-Norman castle. Built in the late 12th century by Hugh de Lacy, its massive stone keep, curtain walls, and towers offer a striking glimpse into medieval power and design. A guided tour brings the castle's history to life, leading visitors through the impressive keep, great hall, and battlements. The tour also offers panoramic views over Trim town and the surrounding countryside.



Trim Medieval Armoury



Trim Medieval Armoury offers a fascinating glimpse into the weapons and defences of the Middle Ages in Trim. Located next door to Trim Castle, the collection showcases authentic medieval arms, armour, and replicas, with expert guides explaining how they were used in battle and daily life.
