Boyne Greenway & Boyne Valley Camino

Running from Dominic's Park in Drogheda, the Boyne Greenway takes you along the river close to the Mary McAleese Cable Bridge and then along the Boyne Canal to the Battle of the Boyne Visitor Centre at Oldbridge. Suitable for pedestrians and cyclists.

The Boyne Valley Camino is a self-guided, 25km looped walk from Drogheda, forming part of the Celtic Camino series. Download a Boyne Valley Camino Map & Guide or pick up a copy from the Drogheda Tourist Office.

Boyne Valley to Lakelands Greenway

Ireland's newest greenway currently provides 30kms of car free pathway commencing at Blackwater Park in Navan in the heart of the Boyne Valley. Ireland's most walking friendly greenway has 2 walking loops at Castletown Kilpatrick and at Nobber. boynevalleytolakelandsgreenway.ie

Girley Bog Eco Walk

This 6km trail is of considerable conservation significance and is home to a variety of birds, plants and animals. Walking boots are recommended and interpretive panels are dotted along the route.

Balrath Woods Forest Walk

Balrath can be enjoyed throughout the year. Visit in spring and summer to see woodland wildflowers in their natural habitat. Late summer/early autumn brings plenty of leaves and some fruits/nuts on the trees, some wildflowers and insect life can be seen.

Royal Canal Greenway

The enchanting Royal Canal Greenway is 130km of level towpath, ideal for walkers, runners and cyclists of all ages and stages. Approximately 22km of the Greenway is set in County Meath, with access points at Enfield, Longwood and Hill of Down. Storyboards at the access points guide you along the way, with picnic areas and benches to pause and enjoy your surroundings.

The River Boyne is synonymous with the myths and legends of Ireland and today it provides locals and visitors alike with a fantastic opportunity to engage in outdoor activities.

Boyne Blueway

Flowing through the picturesque heritage town of Trim, the BoyneBlueway is a beautiful stretch of the River Boyne from Trim to Bective Mill. 8kms in length, it can be paddled in 2.5 to 3 hours and is suitable for dabblers and intermediate ability. Canoeing Ireland has graded this section of the river as "Grade II" (generally slow moving and easily manageable, no weirs or obstructions). More information at Trim Visitor Centre.

Trim Porchfield and River Walk

From Trim Castle to the monuments at Newtown, there are many interesting information panels dotted along the river bank providing ample opportunities for learning about the history of this medieval landscape. More information at Trim Visitor Centre.

Boyne Ramparts Heritage Walk

This walk from Navan to Stackallen Bridge is 8km each way. Along this linear stretch there are interpretive panels providing interesting facts. The walk commences in Navan from the carpark on the R153. Visit discoverboynevalley.ie.

The picturesque town of Trim is home to Ireland's largest Anglo-Norman Castle. Built in 1172 by Hugh de Lacy, the castle featured in the 1995 epic movie "Braveheart" starring Mel Gibson. Once the inauguration site of the ancient high kings of Ireland, the Hill of Tara was used for millennia as a ritual assembly and burial site. The Hill is accessible all year round with AV presentation and guided tours available from Visitor Centre during Summer months.



Old Mellifont Abbey

Mellifont Abbey was one of the wealthiest and most influential monastic houses in medieval Ireland. Along with its sister Abbey, Bective Abbey, movie set for the medieval epic The Last Duel by Ridley Scott St Malachy, along with a community of Irish and French monks founded this beautiful Cistercian Abbey, the first in Ireland. Site open all year round. Visitor Centre open summer months.

Brú na Bóinne is a UNESCO World Heritage Site and one of the largest and most important prehistoric megalithic sites in Europe. The visitor centre interprets the Neolithic monuments of Newgrange, Knowth and Dowth, and an exhibition at Knowth showcases its megalithic carved stone artwork. All access to the monuments is via Brú na Bóinne Visitor Centre. Advance online booking is required.

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


Discover Boyne Valley...




